Twenty-five years after Rod Serling's death (and forty years after his remarkable TV series premiered), the phrase "Twilight Zone" is part of the world lexicon. And Serling's concept of a fantastic place "between light and shadow," where we humans can learn about ourselves, is part of the world consciousness.

Can't you hear the eerie Twilight Zone theme music right now? THAT is cultural clout!

In 1999, the U.S. Postal Service honored many cultural icons from the 20th Century by issuing postage stamps commemorating their achievements. They omitted a major cultural icon, an early mover-and-shaker in the New Media, the writer who redefined both Fantasy and Television writing: Rod Serling.
